Background

At the 2011 Pennsylvania State Roundtable (SRT), discussions began regarding the need to provide educational opportunities and support to all judicial officers including Juvenile Court Hearing Officers. To aid in this SRT goal the Juvenile Court Hearing Officer Education Committee, originally co-chaired by the Honorable Carol Van Horn, Court of Common Pleas of Franklin & Fulton Counties and the Honorable Albert Masland, Court of Common Pleas of Cumberland County, was convened and asked to develop educational sessions specifically for Dependency Hearing Officers. On November 9, 2011, the first educational session was held and the experience was very welcomed by the Hearing Officers that were able to attend this momentous event.

In 2012, there was a change in leadership and the Honorable Joy Reynolds McCoy, Court of Common Pleas of Lycoming County, chaired the Juvenile Court Hearing Officer Education Committee through May 2018. During her time as the Chairperson, the educational sessions went from occurring annually to now being offered bi-annually. In addition, there was a dramatic increase in Hearing Officers participating in the educational sessions as well as attending the Children's Roundtable Summit.

Since its convening, the Juvenile Court Hearing Officer Education Committee has organized ten (10) educational sessions for Dependency Hearing Officers, including the educational session held on October 4, 2018, found in the "progress and update" section of this report. The contents of previous educational sessions are available for your review in *APPENDIX I*.

As of April 2019, there are 71 Dependency Juvenile Court Hearing Officers located in 34 out of the 60 (57%) judicial districts in Pennsylvania. See *APPENDIX II* for the current number of Hearing Officers that are hearing dependency matters in each judicial district.

Progress and Update on Approved 2018 State Roundtable Recommendations

The Juvenile Court Hearing Officer Education Committee organized one education session, which was held on October 4, 2018. Progress made on the 2018 SRT recommendation is presented in further detail throughout this section of the report.

Fall 2018 Education Session

On October 4, 2018, an educational session was held at the Sheraton Harrisburg/Hershey Hotel, Harrisburg, PA. There were 45 Hearing Officers and 4 Judges in attendance. The session was a full day and included the following topics:

- Mental Health Issues in Dependency Court: Bridging the Medico-legal Information Gap
- I Do Not Qualify for Homebound Instruction, but I refuse to Go to School – Help Me!
- Family First Prevention Services Act: What Dependency Courts Can Stop Doing
- Ethical Situations and Considerations in Dependency
- Case Law Update

Participation evaluation results showed an overall rating of 4.6/5.0 and an overall relevancy of 4.7/5.0. Some participants asked for future education sessions to focus on parents with mental health concerns and addressing safety of the children; and what courts need to know about children diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder. A complete overview of the evaluation can be found in ***APPENDIX III***.

Spring 2019 Education Session

Previously the Spring Education Sessions were held in April, however the Juvenile Court Hearing Officer Education Committee has elected to move the Spring training to a later timeframe. The Committee was concerned that with the Spring Education Session and the Children's Roundtable Summit being held during the same month, this could possibly prevent some Hearing Officers from being able to attend both events. The Committee strongly encourages Hearing Officers to attend the Children's Roundtable Summit and fully recognizes the importance of them being a part of their county's team. In order to support their attendance at both educational opportunities, the Spring 2019 Education Session is scheduled to occur on June 6, 2019. An update on this education session will be provided in the 2020 State Roundtable Report.

Juvenile Court Procedural Rule 1182 Distance Education Training

On July 30, 2018, Thomas B. Darr, Court Administrator of Pennsylvania announced that the Juvenile Court Procedural Rule 1182 Distance Education Training was available on the Juvenile Court Judge's Commission (JCJC) educational platform. Jurisdictions can submit the Juvenile Court Hearing Officer Certification Training Request Form for an individual to be given access to the online course. As of April 2019, 10 individuals have completed the Juvenile Court Procedural Rule 1182 Distance Education Training and have become new Hearing Officers for the Dependency System.

The Juvenile Court Hearing Officer Education Committee respectfully submits to the Pennsylvania State Roundtable the following recommendation:

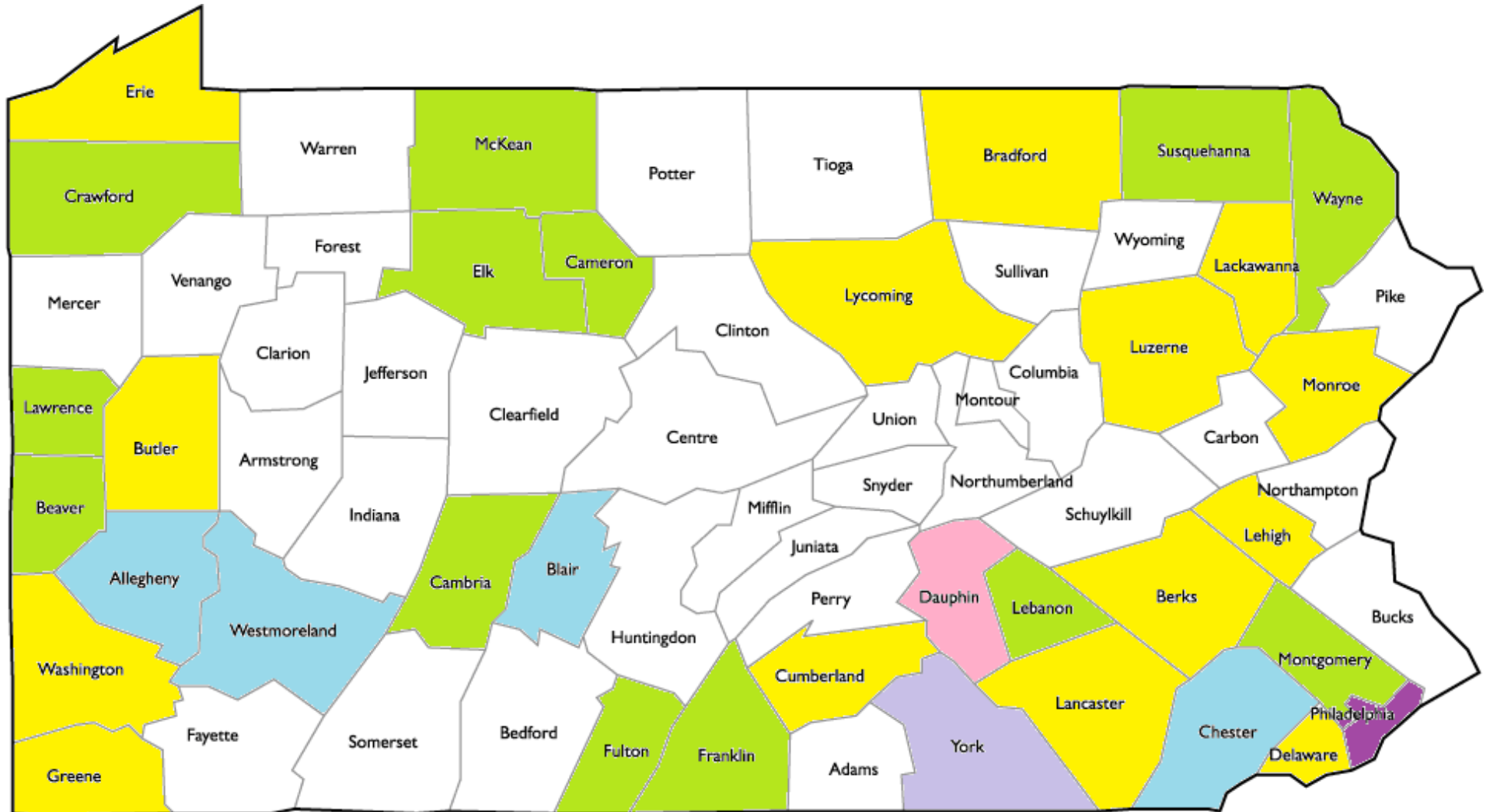
