It is divided into four sections.</p> <p>The first is written by a pediatrician and geneticist presenting information regarding the medical background for ASD, how it is diagnosed, and treatment options.</p> <p>The second section provides a review of federal cases and the Individual with Disability Education Act to assist in court-ordered services. The third section presents published appellate family law cases involving children with ASD. It applies to specific areas of child protection, custody, visitation, juvenile delinquency, and child support cases.
